BATTLE OF FROMELLES

On the 19th of July 2022, the 106th anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles, I had the honour of laying a wreath at the foot of the 'Cobbers' statue in the Shrine precinct near the corner of Domain and St Kilda Roads, on behalf of the 58th/32nd Infantry Battalion Association. Those two battalions and many others which made up the Australian 5th Division suffered 5,533 casualties, including over 1,700 killed or missing, during that disastrous battle.

My great uncle, Lieutenant Eric Chinner, aged just 22 at the time, was one of those killed. A wood-framed portrait of Eric is in the WW1 display behind the bar in the back part of the bistro. Eric's family worshipped in the little Baptist Church in the South Australian town of Peterborough (about halfway between Adelaide and Broken Hill), and about 15 years ago the church was put up for sale. A cleaner who was getting it ready for inspection had a look in a cavity below the floor and found Eric's portrait along with similar ones of three other members of the small congregation who had been killed in WW1. The cleaner got in touch with Chinnners in the Adelaide phone directory, and one of them contacted my (now deceased) brother John in Camberwell, and he made a trip to Melbourne to give John the portrait, which I now own and treasure.

So the Air Training Corps to which this group belonged was born.

On the first Friday of each month, many of this branch of the RAAF Association and their wives/partners gather for lunch in the Box Hill RSL bistro and enjoy a great affinity with its management who always make the group most welcome.

100th Anniversary of the RAAF

This year marks the 100th Anniversary of the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF), and our new display in the main Memorabilia Cabinet commemorates this.

From its modest beginnings in March 1921, the RAAF has grown into a potent, world-class air force, which Australia relies upon in times of both conflict and peace. The men and women of the RAAF have achieved remarkable success in serving Australia and its national interests over the past 100 years.

Our display shows a colourful background of blue (the colour of the RAAF) with a jet plane streaking across the skies. Our first mannequin is dressed in an original bomber crew outfit, complete with leather flying jacket, boots, and survival life jacket. These uniforms were worn by the flight crews of 'Bomber Command' during WW2, and the photo is the famous one of 460 Squadron. You may have heard of 'G for George' (the Lancaster Bomber of the Squadron) which is on display at the Australian War Memorial for all to see. Our second mannequin is also dressed in a WW2 fighter bomber outfit (again, all original).

During WW2, Bomber Command lost a total of 4,100 airmen. There were many more wounded, and the total number of casualties is the greatest the RAAF has ever suffered.

From here, we move on to Korea, the next conflict Australia was involved in. The photos in this display show men working on their aircraft, which were used throughout this conflict. After Korea, our display features the Vietnam conflict. The RAAF began its involvement in Vietnam in 1964, when a flight of Caribous began flying transport operations around South Vietnam. RAAF Iroquois helicopters (known as 'Hueys') began operations the following year, and in 1967 a squadron of Canberra Bombers arrived in the country. All ground operations in South Vietnam were supported by the RAAF and the Huey helicopters. These choppers saved many lives with evacuations and fire support from the sky. At the battle of Long Tan, the choppers saved the day, dropping much needed ammunition in tropical rain while under enemy fire.



Anyone who served in Vietnam remembers the sound of the Hueys flying overhead. Our two Mannequins (sitting) are in an original flying suit of a Vietnam RAAF pilot, and the other is in RAAF dress uniform.

The last mannequin is dressed in the camouflage uniform of today's RAAF. These uniforms were worn by the flying squadrons in Iraq and Afghanistan. They are still worn today on both peaceful and warlike operations. It is with immense pride that Box Hill RSL presents this RAAF display to its members, guests and visitors.

There are many true stories that can be told about the RAAF. I remember listening to our WW2 RAAF servicemen telling their stories at the Box Hill RSL. One of those men was a pilot with Bomber Command, Earl Buttfield. Everyone just loved him and his stories, and those who heard them will never forget them.

Screenwriter Tom Flynn offers a well-considered and genuinely moving story about how we deal with gifted children – and adults.




