Day Section

We kicked off 2025 with our AGM giving our members an update on our Section followed by an informal chew'n'chat session. This is always popular with our members, particularly at this time of year when there is plenty to discuss after the festive season.

On 11th February, we celebrated St. Valentine's Day in advance with everyone getting some chocolate hearts as they came in. I gave an account of the origin of the custom which dated back to the 3rd Century in Italy. Valentine and Valentina were very popular names at that time. Emperor Claudius the second had outlawed marriage for young Christian men but a clergyman/priest named Valentine performed marriage ceremonies in secret. When jailed for this, he befriended a jailer who had a blind daughter. Valentine cured her blindness but was still executed for performing the marriages. Shortly before his execution he sent the girl a letter signed "From your Valentine." He was buried on Via Flaminia on 14th February so this date has been observed as the "Feast of St. Valentine" since the 8th Century. Through folk traditions, it has become a significant cultural, religious and commercial celebration of romance and love all over the World. People like to visit Verona in Italy, the home of Shakespeare's 'Juliet', to leave love letters/ padlocks on the balcony as a symbol of commitment. I wonder if that is where the fairly recent craze of putting padlocks on Melbourne's bridges originated. St. Valentine keys are given to lovers as a romantic symbol and as an invitation to unlock the giver's heart, as well as to children to ward off epilepsy (aka St. Valentine's Malady.)

Janet now knows the significance of her old carved wooden spoon after my explaining that from the 17th Century these were given to loved ones in Wales on 25th January to celebrate St. Dwynwen, the patron saint of lovers. Snowdrops are the present in Denmark and in South Africa. This is the Roman tradition of Lupercalia and is acknowledged by pinning the name of your love interest on your sleeve. Now you can understand the saying "wear your heart on your sleeve." A whole week is devoted to celebrations in July in Argentina.

Everyone listened intently to my whistle-stop World tour of Valentine customs and added bits too about this and other customs they are familiar with. We certainly are a multicultural nation and we need to respect others' beliefs. Some countries ban Valentine celebrations as these conflict with Islamic culture.

On 25th February, Chris Newman entertained us with old, familiar songs but there were some different ones in his repertoire. It's always good to hear everyone join in and he had no bother getting us to do so. Once again there were lots of smiles and cheeriness as everyone exited the Upton Room.

Charis, our March speaker from Eastern Health, gave us a real insight into food labelling. She began by asking us how many read food labels and seemed surprised that so many of us do. Jeannine had supplied boxes/packaging from foodstuffs and Charis explained some of the information. I was amazed that there are almost 20 types of sugar/ sweeteners. Non-nutritive sweeteners influence blood glucose causing later sugar spikes and can lead to health issues. She dispelled some myths e.g. supposed health foods are not always healthy and star ratings are not always reliable. Many products have no bearing on cholesterol despite being advertised as being beneficial.

Another fascinating list was that of different types/names for salt of which there were at least 18. The list of fats also had about 20 variations on it too. Despite saving "no fat" some products actually do contain fat even though it is less than 1%.

From personal experience, I know food colourings and flavourings can and do affect behaviour and concentration amongst children. The response can be virtually instant and can last a long time. Perhaps more research should be done on diet-related behaviour for conditions such as ADD/ADHD.

Charis gave us advice on how to seek help re diets and apps which give information. This proved a very worthwhile talk, judging by comments made, questions asked and information being sought by our members. Thanks, Jeannine, for arranging it.

Mr Furuya responded, telling everyone what a credit it was to Box Hill RSL to have done such a magnificent job creating this display.

Invited guests, including Mr Keith Wolahan MP, Mr Paul Hamer State MP, Mr Robert Clark a previous state MP and Attorney General, along with some of the Box Hill Committee celebrated the occasion and enjoyed a beautiful morning tea in the Lancaster Bar. Also on hand were members of the Japanese Art association. All who were present had a special morning as the attached photos show.

Two special guests who attended this unveiling of the exhibition were responsible for putting this exhibition together. They are Mark Whorlow and Colin McDonald. These two gentlemen worked for three days to bring this exhibition together and I thank them for all of their time and patience.

The exhibition consists of one full suite of Samurai Armour. An interesting note is that there is not an ounce of leather, the armour is all sewn by hand. The head dress is the same and both look splendid in the purpose-made exhibition units. There are nine Samurai swords dating back many hundreds of years - in fact one is around 600 years old. I pass this exhibition every day at the RSL and cannot but help to notice something different in it. The response to this display has been extraordinary, and people often ask me if this is the best display I have done -- it is certainly up there with them.





In approximately one months' time, we intend to update this display with all new artefacts. I would encourage everyone to look as it may not be there very soon.
