Memorabilia Box Hill RSL first in Australia

Many of our members, and for that matter the general public have noticed our twenty-meter-long exhibition aptly named "Mini Ink". This exhibition is of many returned soldiers, both male and female, that have returned to Australia from active duty overseas, and who have gone and got a tattoo of some description Tattooed on their body.



This ritual came about from WW1, when the soldiers returned and they had a Tattoo of some description on their arm, leg, back, on their chest, etc. This happened again after WW2, Korea, and Vietnam.

And so, after all the conflicts that Australian Troops were involved in right up to Afghanistan, the "Mini Ink" represents all of these conflicts. It has taken me three years of hard work to get this exhibition at Box Hill RSL. Around February of this year, after going backward and forward to the Australian War Memorial (AWM), I received the exhibition. It took Glenn, Harry, and myself some time to sort out the photos and to put them in some sort of sequence, because this exhibition had not been shown before in Australia. We were on our own, but we got there.

We all believe the result was worth all the headaches, and we can now stand back and say what a great job we have done. We sent photos of our exhibition to the AWM in Canberra, and they were amazed at the job and expertise we had done. The exhibition has gone on the AWM website, and I am happy to say we have had emails from others giving their approval.

In this Exhibition, there is a video telling all visitors about various veterans' experience in having their Tattoos. As you move forward there is another story board which I hope all of you take the time to read. Then there are various photos of veterans, and one in particular with virtually his whole

body tattooed. This gentleman was on television in the series, "When the War is Over". A great series which again I am of the opinion everyone should watch.

The "Mini Ink" exhibition will stay on display until the end of August. We have this exhibition for two years, and after a period, we will install it again for everyone to see. Those who have seen it have told me it takes a little time to fully appreciate it. I completely understand, as it also took me a time to appreciate this exhibition. Everyone who has taken the time to see it and read everything has told me how wonderful it is. Please don't just browse through the photos, I encourage everyone to take the time and look at the entire display.

I have organised many exhibitions over the years, and I have to say this one has to be the most satisfying. Every morning I am at the Box Hill RSL, I take time to read another part of the exhibition, time after time and I understand it a little better. I encourage all members to take time to read and look at the photographs. I am sure that, after doing so, you will better understand why our veterans since WW1 have done this.

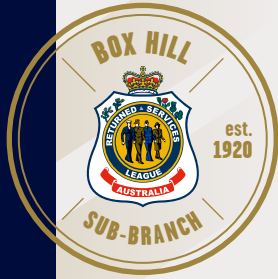

New Memorabilia Room Completed

Storm Damage and the Need for a New Space

Around two years ago, a severe storm passed over Box Hill. Because the roof on the new construction had not yet been completed, a large amount of water entered the RSL and flooded the Memorabilia rooms on B2. Several uniforms, hats and shirts were damaged by water and had to be discarded.

Planning a Purpose-Built Memorabilia Room

At a committee meeting the following year, it was decided that we look elsewhere within the RSL for a suitable location to build a purpose-built Memorabilia room. An area on B1 was selected. You may have noticed

construction taking place at the northern end of B1 late last year and into this year. That work has now become our new Memorabilia room and is the result of many years of dreaming about having a dedicated space for our collection.

Our architects have delivered an outstanding room built to museum standards and under budget.

Construction, Cataloguing and Preservation

A Memorabilia sub-committee oversaw the construction to ensure the room would meet both our current and future needs. The completed room includes dedicated hanging areas for uniforms and related items.

Harry Moyle, Herman Harberts and I have logged and numbered more than 200 uniforms, with around 50 still to be completed. Many are highly valuable and have previously been displayed in exhibitions I have arranged.

Next Steps and Visitor Access

Our next task is to catalogue all the Memorabilia artefacts collected over many years. Some of these items are valuable and, in many cases, can no longer be obtained.

The photo shows me with my assistant, Harry Moyle, and Danny Cato, who constructed the new room. Unfortunately, Herman Harberts, our other assistant, was not available for the photo.

We are very proud of what has been achieved. If you would like to have a look, please contact me and I will arrange an inspection as the Memorabilia room is not open to the general public.

The tour of the VCentre was truly eye-opening, providing valuable insight into the remarkable work being undertaken to support veterans, as well as the inspiring stories of their resilience, recovery, and progress.

Our sincere thanks go to Chris Gray for coordinating such a worthwhile and rewarding visit. The ladies greatly appreciated the opportunity to contribute in a practical way while gaining a deeper understanding of the care and support provided to our veterans. The visit concluded with a lovely morning tea, providing an opportunity to reflect on the experience and enjoy each other's company.

At our June meeting, it was clear that winter had well and truly arrived, with 14 members sending their apologies, most due to illness. Those who were able to attend, however, were treated to an enjoyable presentation by our Sub-Branch President, John Haward, who shared stories where he grew up and the life events that followed.

While at school, he and a few mates formed a band, playing local gigs and entering a competition where they finished third, behind the Easybeats, who took first place.

He was enjoying life and working for Liquor Licensing when he received a letter requiring him to register for National Service. His birth date was drawn from the ballot, and he was called up in June 1967. Following training at Puckapunyal, and two weeks with his regiment, he was deployed to the war zone in Vietnam.

John spoke about his Army tour in Vietnam with the Armoured Corps, where he served as a tank gunner.

Along with his crew, he was based at Nui Dat. He shared photographs and recounted his experiences of fighting in dense jungle terrain, surviving landmine explosions, and encountering the Viet Cong (VC).

He shares the story of his 21st birthday whilst in Vietnam and his mum sending a birthday cake, which arrived on his actual birthday. John recounted a story, involving a grenade that exploded inside his tank, leaving him wounded, and also watching one of his mates suffer devastating injuries before being evacuated by helicopter. John held nothing back, speaking candidly about the realities and atrocities of war, the children caught in the conflict, the families torn apart, and the difficulties veterans faced on returning home, including being shunned by some members of the community.

To end on a lighter note, John concluded his presentation with several humorous stories of his tour, providing a welcome contrast to the sobering experiences he had shared.

To brighten up the season, 15 of our members enjoyed a wonderful **Christmas in July lunch at The Coach in Ringwood**. As always, we could rely on Helen and John Harrington to spread the festive cheer, arriving dressed in their Christmas gear.

Everyone enjoyed a delicious and plentiful meal, with lots of chatter and good company. Just when we thought we couldn't eat another bite, Judy and Emi's dessert arrived, homemade Sticky Date Puddings with ice cream. The two desserts were enormous, so generous they could almost have been shared among everyone at the table!

Needless to say, a few doggy bags made the trip home. It was a fantastic afternoon, full of good food, great company, and plenty of Christmas spirit.

It feels like only yesterday we were celebrating Mother's Day, but behind the scenes we're already gearing up for Father's Day, which is just around the corner.

Sadly, hearing is one of the most neglected senses we possess. Some of our members took up the offer Kartik made to have their hearing assessed after his talk was finished.
